COLLECTIVE WORSHIP

On Monday, the children noticed that the drapes had turned to purple as are now in the season of Lent. During this week, we have thought about what Lent is and what we can do during this season. Lent is a time that helps us to remember the many ways that Jesus came to help us and it is also reminds us how much we are loved by God. During Lent, we can show our love for God and other people by: praying, fasting and giving to charities. Today, Key Stage Two made a great start to Lent by taking part in the Faith Lunch. They ate a simpler, smaller lunch so that the money saved can be donated to out Lent charities. Well done.

On Monday, we listened to a Gospel reading from Mark's Gospel which told us about Jesus spending 40 days in the desert which is why Lent is 40 days long. During his time in the desert, Jesus was tempted to make wrong choices, just like we are sometimes tempted. Sometimes it is hard to make the right choices but if we pray to God he will help us.

Our new virtue at the start of this half term is charity. Pope Francis says, "To live charitably means not looking out for our own interests, but carrying the burdens of the weakest and poorest among us."

Over the next few weeks we will be thinking about the importance of:

- treating everyone as we would like to be treated;
- doing simple acts of kindness to show our love;
- showing our love for God by caring for others;
- giving our time to help others and sharing what we have with others.

CLASS PAGES

YEAR R NEWS

What an exciting week in Reception. On Monday, we came to school to find a nest had been left on the carpet. We tried to work out which animal it could have come from. We then found a letter that told us the nest had been left by dinosaur! We checked the CCTV to find that a T-Rex had been stomping around our classroom! We wrote some super messages to tell others all about it.

In Maths, we have learnt about the numbers 6,7 and 8. We looked at the composition of each number and different representations. We also learnt about one more than each number.

In RE, we learnt about the importance of kindness and how we need to say to sorry if we hurt others. We made a kindness jar to keep on our prayer table. We also thought about times when we have showed kindness to family and friends.

On Thursday, we learnt about the importance of staying safe whilst on the internet. We also enjoyed a science afternoon where we worked with other children in our team houses and investigated jumping and running.

YEAR 1 NEWS

In RE, we have started our new topic which is called, "Following Jesus". This week, we talked about friendship and what makes a good friend. We then found out about Jesus' friends and thought about what qualities they would have. We watched a short video showing when Jesus became friends with Peter.

We have started reading our new book, "Little Red" in English. We made predictions about what it would be about and looked at pictures to describe what we could see.

In Maths, we have started looking at adding numbers within 20 using Numicon, counters and number bonds to help us.

The children enjoyed their first Science lesson about everyday materials on Tuesday afternoon. They had to put post it notes around the classroom labelling fabric, wood, plastic and metal. Unfortunately for Mr Gilhooly and Miss Earley, who came into the classroom during this activity and were soon covered in post-it notes with fabric written on!

In ICT, the children have been using Beebots over the past few weeks. This week, the children had to plan a route for the Beebot to follow and then enter the correct directions.

YEAR 2 NEWS

In Maths, we have been practising making and comparing amounts of money. We used coins and notes to make amounts in different ways. We found that we could make some amounts in lots of different ways! We compared amounts of money by finding totals.

In English, we started a new book - "The Tiger Who Came To Tea", by Judith Kerr. We all enjoyed discussing what it would be like to have a tiger round for tea. We thought about having a tea party of our own. We looked at an invitation before discussing the features and having a go at writing an invitation letter to Tiger.

In RE, we enjoyed finding out about the special book used in Sikhism. We found out that it is called the Guru Granth Sahib. It is covered when it is not in use and is treated like a human. The Guru Granth Sahib is kept on a raised platform and it contains hymns, prayers and poems. We compared this special book with the Christian special book; the Bible.



YEAR 3 NEWS

In English, we made predictions about our new class novel 'The Firework Maker's Daughter'. The children used excerpts from the text to create a character description for Lila before writing a letter as her running away to Mount Merapi.

In RE, we thought about the meaning of reconciliation, and why rules are important. We reflected on the Great Commandment and thought about why it is important to forgive, before writing our own prayers of forgiveness.

In Maths, we divided 2-digit numbers by 1-digit numbers. We used concrete apparatus to support us in dividing by partitioning into tens and ones before partitioning numbers flexibly to divide them.

In Geography, we used latitude and longitude coordinates to locate different volcanoes around the world, and saw how many of these were located along the Ring of Fire.

On Thursday, we took part in a whole school science experiment! We mixed with different year groups in our house teams to carry out experiments to answer the questions "Do people with the longest legs jump the furthest?" and "Do people with the longest legs run the fastest?"

YEAR 4 NEWS

In Maths, we have started our new topic on length and perimeter. The children began by partitioning measurements into the number of kilometres and metres and making links with addition. We then looked a equivalent lengths using the fact that 1 km is equal to 1,000 m to derive related facts using numbers up to 10,000.

In English, we have enjoyed reading our new class text 'The Last Bear'. Using the front cover, the children made inferences and predictions about what the book might be about before being introduced to it. The children then began to write the first draft of a poem inspired by the book, highlighting the issue of plastic pollution and its impact on the Arctic regions.

We continued to develop our programming skills in computing. This week, the children worked with count-controlled loops in a range of contexts. First, they will think about a real-life example, then they will move on to using count-controlled loops in regular 2D shapes.

YEAR 5 NEWS

In English, we finished reading 'Freedom Bird' and have begun looking at Harriet Tubman who was an infamous woman during the American Civil War and helped over a thousand enslaved individuals escape from their enslavers. We briefly spent time learning about the underground railroad and how this allowed people to escape and be free. We then read a biography on Harriet Tubman and annotated the key features of a biography. The children will use this to help them write their own biographies next week.

In Maths, we have come to the end of our Multiplication & Division B unit. The children have spent time this week, working out division calculations using the short division methods. We recapped our times table knowledge and basic division facts and applied this to the formal methods. The children were able to recognise how to divide a 4-digit number by a 1-digit number as well as dividing with remainders.

In RE, we ended our inspirational people topic by focusing on Ghandi and writing about how he was an inspirational man. The children identified key parts of his life which meant he would an inspiration to others as well and describing how he was an inspiration to them. They made links between his way of living to that of the Beatitudes and explained how he lived by some of our Catholic ways of life.

YEAR 6 NEWS

In Maths, we have looked at recipes and used our ratio skills to alter them to make more or less. We did this by multiplying or dividing the amounts given. On Thursday, we started our algebra topic by looking at 1-step and 2-step function machines. We thought algebra would be really difficult but it's actually quite easy so far.

In English, we began writing our plans for our newspaper report about the Three Little Pigs boiling the Big Bad Wolf alive. We have planned each section ready to write next week.

In RE, we looked at the Communion and the Eucharist and the importance of the Consecration. We analysed a stain glass window which depicted the Eucharist and discussed what we could see, the importance of it for Christians and what we would change. After this, we thought about which Pope Francis quote linked best to the stain glass window.

In History, we looked at Britain's involvement in the slave trade. We found out the John Hawkins asked Elizabeth I to be involved in the slave trade to grow the wealth and power of the British Empire. Britain had a significant impact on the transatlantic slave trade because we transported over 3 million slaves from the 1500s to the 1800s.
